## Parish Life Survey Saint Ann Parish Arlington, Virginia

### **Executive Summary**

The St. Ann Parish Life Survey was designed by the Center for Applied Research in the Apostolate (CARA) at Georgetown University. Most of the questions were derived from CARA's database of nationally tested questions. The parish distributed the questionnaire to those attending its liturgies over one weekend in April 2016. In all, there were 869 valid responses, with two respondents under age 16 not included in the analysis. There were 831 valid responses to the English-language version of the questionnaire and 38 valid responses to the Spanish-language version.

Major findings can be summarized as follows:

#### **Respondent Demographics**

- The average age of St. Ann Parish respondents overall is 53. Half of all respondents are age 54 or younger.
- CARA divides Catholics into four generations, reflective of the age categories used by many other social scientists. The most common generation at St. Ann Parish is the Post-Vatican II Generation (45 percent of all respondents), ages 35 to 55 in 2016.
- Eight in ten respondents identify as white, Anglo, or Caucasian; one in ten identifies as Hispanic/Latino(a); and nearly one in ten identifies as Asian or Pacific Islander. One percent identifies as black, African, or African America and 1 percent identifies as American Indian or Alaska Native. Three percent claim more than one racial or ethnic identity.
- Nearly six in ten are female and a little more than four in ten are male. Three in four respondents say they are currently married or remarried. Just under two in ten have never married, one in 20 is divorced or separated, and one in 20 is widowed.

#### **Religious Characteristics of Respondents**

• On average, respondents have attended the parish for 15 years, with half having attended ten years or less.

- More than eight in ten say they are registered at the parish. More than four in ten say they live closer to another parish.
- About three in four say they have been active Catholics since birth, One in ten is a convert to Catholicism, and one in ten identifies as a returned Catholic. Two percent say they are inactive Catholics and 3 percent identify as non-Catholics.

#### **Assessment of Parish Life and Needs**

- Nearly all (97 percent) give St. Ann Parish overall a positive evaluation ("good" and "excellent" combined). Almost six in ten rate it as "excellent."
- Nine in ten agree at least "somewhat" that they feel included in parish life, with almost half agreeing "strongly" that they do. The older the generation of respondents, the more likely they are to "strongly" agree that they feel included.
- The sense of community within the parish receives a positive evaluation from nine in ten respondents. A little more than four in ten give it an "excellent" rating.
- Seven in ten "strongly" agree that having people of different cultural backgrounds enriches the parish.
- More than seven in ten report being attracted to the parish "very much" by its open, welcoming spirit. About four in ten are as attracted by its religious education for children/youth, St. Ann Catholic School, and its programs in one's native language.
- Youth Faith Formation programs (K-8), Invictus Youth Ministry programs (teens), and St. Ann Catholic School are especially likely to receive high priority from respondents. About six in ten give each "very much" priority.
- Respondents were also invited to choose from a predetermined list the three needs to which parish should give most priority. The top five identified are St. Ann Catholic School, Youth Faith Formation (K-8), Invictus Youth Ministry programs (teens), promoting peace and justice opportunities, and Adult Religious Enrichment. These needs are listed by three-tenths to half of respondents.
- When asked to write in what needs or programs the parish should most focus on in the
  next one to three years, respondents are particularly likely to cite social justice-related
  needs, followed by worship-related needs, needs related to evangelization and a greater
  sense of community.
- Parish efforts to communicate with parishioners receive a positive evaluation from nine in ten respondents, with almost half rating these efforts as "excellent." Just over a quarter "strongly" agree that they use the parish website as a source of information.

#### Leadership

- Nearly nine in ten give a positive evaluation to the vision provided by parish leaders, with four in ten rating it as "excellent." The leadership provided by the pastor receives an "excellent" rating from two-thirds of respondents.
- Four in ten "strongly" agree that they are aware of the Missionhurst presence at St. Ann's.
- The Parish Finance Council and Parish Pastoral Council receive an "excellent" rating from four in ten. Just under three in ten "strongly" agree that they feel informed about parish finances.
- Parish efforts to consult with parishioners on important decisions receive an "excellent" rating from four in ten. Four in ten also "strongly" agree that parishioners are encouraged to have a role in decision making at the parish.
- The helpfulness of the parish office staff receives an "excellent" rating from six in ten respondents.

#### Worship

- Masses and liturgies in general receive a positive evaluation from more than nine in ten respondents. Just over half rate them as "excellent."
- Two in three say they currently attend Mass at least once a week. Another quarter attend almost every week.
- Two in three rate the hospitality or sense of welcome at weekend Masses as "excellent." The homilies in general receive an "excellent" rating from almost six in ten, with almost half giving the music at weekend Masses as high a rating.
- Bilingual Masses receive an "excellent" evaluation from almost half, with just over a third giving as high a rating to efforts to incorporate cultural traditions in worship. Hispanics/Latinos(as) are particularly likely to evaluate them as "excellent."
- Having more opportunities for devotions (rosaries, Adoration) receives "very much" priority from two in ten respondents.

#### **Formation**

• Parish efforts to educate parishioners in the faith receive a positive evaluation from nine in ten respondents, with just under half giving these efforts an "excellent" rating.

- Efforts to nurture one's relationship with Jesus Christ receive an "excellent" rating from almost half of respondents. A third say the parish is "excellent" at helping them practice gospel values at work.
- Youth Faith Formation programs (K-8) receive an "excellent" rating from almost half of respondents, with slightly more than half giving as high a rating to the Invictus Youth Ministry programs (teens). About six in ten give each of these programs "very much" priority.
- St. Ann Catholic School overall receives an "excellent" rating from half. About half give as high a rating to the principal and the quality of teaching. Nearly six in ten say the parish should give the school "very much" priority.
- When asked why those with children school age did *not* send their children to St. Ann Catholic School, respondents are particularly likely to cite financial considerations/tuition costs and the high quality of the local public schools.
- One in six says they have attended adult religious education classes at the parish. Almost four in ten report being "very" likely to spend time learning more about their faith in the next year.
- The Adult Religious Enrichment programs receive an "excellent" rating from four in ten, with about four in ten giving these programs "very much" priority.
- Adult Bible study programs and the provision of retreat opportunities receive "very much" priority from about a quarter of respondents. Hispanic/Latino(a) respondents are particularly likely to give these programs "very much" priority.

#### Stewardship

- More than eight in ten agree at least "somewhat" that they understand the concept of stewardship, with slightly more than half agreeing "strongly" that they do.
- Parish efforts to encourage parishioners to share their time, talents and treasure with the parish receive a positive evaluation from nine in ten respondents. Almost half rate these efforts as "excellent." In a related finding, half evaluate parish efforts to invite participation in ministries as "excellent."
- On average, St. Ann Parish respondents report being involved with one ministry or activity at the parish. Half are not involved with any, three in ten are involved with one, and two in ten are involved with two or more.
- Four in ten indicate they are "very" likely to volunteer for a parish ministry in the next year. A quarter "strongly" agree that they would volunteer more if they knew parish needs.

- One in six agrees "strongly" that he or she needs help identifying the gifts they can contribute to the parish.
- Three-quarters agree at least "somewhat" that they would support a capital campaign for funds for school and church building improvements. Three in ten "strongly" agree they would.
- Just over one in ten "strongly" agrees that they would be inclined to remember the parish in their will if they knew it would go to a St. Ann School Endowment.

#### **Evangelization and Parish Outreach**

- Efforts to spread the Gospel/evangelize receive a positive rating from nearly nine in ten respondents. A third give these efforts an "excellent" rating. In a related finding, a quarter say they are "very" likely to invite someone to a parish service in the next year.
- When asked to evaluate parish outreach to 13 groups, respondents are most likely to give an "excellent" rating to outreach to teens, Hispanics/Latinos(as), new parishioners, those sick or homebound, and children. They are least likely to give the same rating to outreach to single adults, those divorced or separated, and inactive Catholics.
- Respondents were asked to choose the top three groups to which the parish should give most priority for outreach. The three most commonly selected groups are teens, those sick or homebound, and young adults.
- Parish efforts to strengthen family life receive an "excellent" evaluation from four in ten.

#### **Social Justice**

- Outreach to and advocacy for those in need receive a positive rating from nine in ten respondents. Four in ten rate these efforts as "excellent." In addition, just over four in ten rate efforts to provide opportunities for them to volunteer to help the needy as "excellent."
- Promoting peace and justice opportunities receives "very much" priority from more than four in ten.
- Concerning parish contributions to social justice efforts, respondents were asked to
  choose their top priority from among four options. Half list charities such as homeless
  shelters and food banks as their top priority. Nearly three in ten list empowerment of the
  poor, such as job programs. Those of the three oldest generations are most likely to
  choose the first option, with Millennials most likely to choose the second.

#### Introduction

The St. Ann Parish Life Survey was designed by the Center for Applied Research in the Apostolate (CARA) at Georgetown University. Most of the questions were derived from CARA's database of nationally tested questions. The parish distributed the questionnaire to those attending its liturgies over one weekend in April 2016. In all, there were 869 valid responses, with two respondents under age 16 not included in the analysis. There were 831 valid responses to the English-language version of the questionnaire and 38 valid responses to the Spanish-language version. Following standard assumptions of statistical inference, a sample size of 869 provides a margin of error of approximately  $\pm 3.3$  percentage points. <sup>1</sup>

### **Interpreting This Report**

Most of the questions in this survey use four point response scales ("not at all," "only a little," "somewhat," "very much"; or "poor," "fair," "good," "excellent"). These scales allow half of the responses to be interpreted as relatively more "negative" ("poor" and "fair," for example) and half as relatively more "positive" ("good" and "excellent," for example). In parts of the analysis in this report, these responses are combined to allow for clearer comparisons. However, sometimes examining the most positive response distinguishes important contrasts in level of support.

In addition, readers may also wish to compare the difference between the two extreme responses, say "poor" and "excellent," to compare the level of intensity with which opposing opinions are held. These comparisons and others may be drawn by referring to the actual percentage responses given in Appendix I. That appendix shows the percentage responses for each item, calculated out of 100 percent, as well as the percentage of all respondents that did not respond to each question, separately calculated out of 100 percent for clarity of comparison.

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<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>1</sup>Strictly speaking, it is necessary to know the total population (in this case, the total number of adult parishioners) to calculate margin of error. CARA's standard assumption for its in-pew parish surveys is that about half of parishioners are represented. For obvious reasons, those who are represented in a given in-pew survey are disproportionately more frequent Mass attenders.

In addition to summarizing the responses to most questions for respondents as a whole, the report also compares the responses of those from selected subgroups. The first section of the report describes the characteristics of the respondents as well as the subgroups that are used in the analyses that follow. Throughout the report, the tables and charts that compare differences between and among these various subgroups are presented following the responses for parishioners as a whole in each section.

The margin of error for *differences between subgroups*, such as the differences among those of different generations or those with different levels of involvement, depends on the size of the subgroups being compared. Unless otherwise noted, all subgroup differences described in the figures of this report are statistically significant: that is, they pass standard tests of statistical inference and can be considered to be "real" differences. In some instances, differences between or among subgroups that are not statistically significant are also noted. These differences should be treated as merely suggestive of real differences that may exist between the subgroups under consideration.

CARA regularly conducts parish surveys through its Parish Life Surveys. Parish Life Surveys are a series of dynamic survey instruments for pastoral planning, including survey data collection, analyses of key stakeholders and demographic groups, and user-friendly reports and products. From the aggregate data collected through the Parish Life Survey services over the past 15 years, CARA has a database of characteristics of parish life gathered from more than 900 parishes nationwide. While this database is not a random sample of parishes, and therefore not necessarily representative of all parishes nationwide, it is the most comprehensive source of data of its kind and covers a broad range of topics important to vibrant parish life.

In this report, where possible, results from this St. Ann Parish Life Survey are compared to the aggregate responses from the Parish Life Survey National Database of Parish Life to put the parish results into a larger national context. Additionally, where available, comparisons are made to findings from a 2012 study of Catholics in-pew at 23 parishes across the country. Finally, comparisons are made to findings from CARA's nationally representative surveys of adult self-identified Catholics conducted since 2013.

In addition to the quantitative data analyzed in this report, one open-ended question on the survey collected qualitative data. For these data, respondents were prompted with a question and given an open box for written comments, rather than select from a set of response options. These comments are analyzed, along with the quantitative data, in separate sections throughout this report. While these responses are not suitable for statistical analysis, they do add depth to the data that is not attainable through closed-ended questions only.

The results of this survey fairly represent the characteristics and attitudes of people ages 16 and older who attend Mass at St. Ann Parish. It cannot be used to make inferences about populations outside of Mass attendees at the parish; it is not representative of those who do not attend Mass or those who are only involved in parish functions excluding Mass.

### **Section I: Demographic Characteristics of Respondents**

This section of the report includes demographic and other descriptive data for respondents to this survey. These data may be helpful in considering who responded to the survey, which populations are represented in the data, and characteristics of a typical weekend at the parish.

#### **Age and Generation**

Valid respondents at St. Ann Parish surveyed in 2016 were born between 1915 and 2000. On average, respondents report an average age of 53, with half saying they are 54 or younger. Although not directly comparable as the national data comes from 2012, this is slightly higher than the median age of 49 among all self-identified Catholics nationally. The most common age range reported is 45 to 54.



Important differences between groups in parishes are typically found among those who belong to different generations. CARA divides Catholics into four generations, reflective of the age categories used by many other Catholic researchers. The most common generation among St. Ann respondents is the Post-Vatican II Generation, followed by the Vatican II Generation.



- The "Pre-Vatican II Generation," ages 74 and over in 2016. The Pre-Vatican II Generation was born in 1942 or earlier. Its members came of age before the Second Vatican Council. Members of the Pre-Vatican II Generation make up 12 percent of the respondents at St. Ann Parish. This is similar to the percentage among self-identified Catholics nationally (10 percent), but slightly less than what CARA typically finds in its in-pew surveys (18 percent).
- The "Vatican II Generation," ages 56-73 in 2016. These are the "Baby Boomers" who were born between 1943 and 1960, a time of great demographic and economic growth. They came of age during the time of the Second Vatican Council and their formative years likely spanned that time of profound changes in the Church. Members of the Vatican II Generation at St. Ann Parish represent 29 percent of respondents. This is slightly lower than the percentages of Catholics nationally (32 percent) and Catholics nationally in pew (35 percent).
- The "Post-Vatican II Generation," ages 35-55 in 2016. Born between 1961 and 1981, this generation, sometimes called "Generation X" or "Baby Busters" by demographers, has no lived experience of the pre-Vatican II Church. Some 45 percent of those at St. Ann Parish are members of this generation. This is slightly higher than the percentage among Catholics nationally (38 percent) and among in-pew Catholics (39 percent).
- The "Millennial Generation," ages 20-34 in 2016. This generation, born in 1982 or later (up to 1996 among adults), has come of age primarily under the papacies of John Paul II

and Benedict XVI. Because some still live with their parents, their religious practice is often closely related to that of their families of origin. Some 14 percent of respondents at St. Ann Parish belong to the Millennial Generation or are younger (ages 16 to 19). This percentage is slightly less than the percentage among Catholics nationally (19 percent) and slightly more than the percentage among Catholics in pew nationally (8 percent).


#### **Gender and Marital Status**

Nearly six in ten (57 percent) respondents identify as female. This is slightly less than among Catholics nationally in pew (64 percent) but higher than the percentage female among self-identified Catholics nationally (51 percent).

Three in four respondents are currently married or remarried. About one in seven has never married, one in 20 is divorced or separated, and one in 20 is widowed.



As can be seen in the table below, St. Ann respondents are similar in marital status to Catholics in pew nationally. Compared to self-identified Catholics, St. Ann respondents are more likely to be married and less likely to have never married.

### **Differences by Generation**

Members of the Millennial Generation (70 percent) are particularly likely to have never married, those of the Post-Vatican II Generation (90 percent) are most likely to be married, and those of the Pre-Vatican II Generation (22 percent) are most likely to be widowed.

### **Racial or Ethnic Background**

Respondents were invited to check all of the races and ethnicities with which they identify. Three percent identify more than one. Eight in ten identify as white, Anglo, or Caucasian and one in ten identifies as Hispanic/Latino(a). Nearly one in ten identifies as Asian or Pacific Islander.

Among those identifying an "other" primary race or ethnicity, one respondent wrote in Basque and two wrote in "American."

For comparison purposes throughout the rest of the report, comparisons are made between the following three ethnic groups, who have enough respondents to allow for a valid analysis:

- Asians, Pacific Islanders (8 percent or 67 respondents)
- Hispanics/Latinos(as) (11 percent or 88 respondents)
- Whites, Anglos, Caucasians (81 percent or 644 respondents)

## **Section II: Religious Characteristics of Respondents**

This part of the report describes several characteristics of respondents that relate to their religious attributes and parish-related behaviors.

### **Relationship to the Catholic Church**

More than three-quarters of St. Ann respondents say they have been active Catholics since birth, with one in ten saying they are returned Catholics and another one in ten identifying as a convert to Catholicism. Two to 3 percent say they are inactive Catholics or non-Catholics.

St. Ann respondents are similar to those responding in pew nationally in how they describe their relationship to the Church.

### **Relationship to the Parish**

Of all respondents, 84 percent report that they are registered at the parish. Some 44 percent report living closer to another parish.


#### Years at the Parish

Mass attenders were asked to write in the number of years they have attended the parish. On average, respondents have attended the parish for 15 years. The median is ten years, meaning that half of respondents have attended for ten years or less and half have attended for ten years or more.

### **Mass Regularly Attended**

Respondents were invited to select the Mass they most regularly attend at the parish. The most commonly chosen Masses were the 11 a.m. Sunday (36 percent) and the 9 a.m. Sunday (27 percent). Not shown in the figure below, 1 percent says they do *not* regularly attend Mass at the parish.



Where relevant throughout the rest of the report, responses are compared according to the Mass time respondents selected.

#### **Frequency of Mass Attendance**

About two-thirds of respondents (68 percent) report attending Mass at least once a week. An additional quarter (26 percent) attend almost every week and one in 20 (5 percent) attends once or twice a month. One percent attends less frequently than that.

#### **Comparison to Catholics Nationally**

- Compared to the average of parishes CARA has conducted surveys at in the past (71 percent), St. Ann respondents are about as likely to attend Mass at least once a week (68 percent).
- St. Ann respondents (68 percent) are considerably more likely to attend Mass at least once a week than are self-identified Catholic adults nationally (23 percent).

#### **Differences by Generation**

Members of the Pre-Vatican II Generation (94 percent) are most likely to attend Mass at least once a week, followed by those of the Vatican II Generation (77 percent), Millennial Generation (61 percent), and Post-Vatican II Generation (61 percent).

Those of the Post-Vatican II Generation (34 percent), on the other hand, are most likely to attend Mass almost every week, followed by those of the Millennial Generation (28 percent), Vatican II Generation (20 percent), and Pre-Vatican II Generation (5 percent).

#### **Participation in Parish Formation Programs**

Respondents report the following family participation in parish formation programs:

- Seventeen percent of respondents have attended adult religious education programs in the past five years at the parish.
- Thirty-four percent have children who have attended religious education classes in the past five years.
- Seventeen percent have children who have attended St. Ann School in the past five years.

#### **Involvement in Ministries and Activities**

Half (49 percent) report being involved with at least one ministry or activity at the parish in the past year. This is similar to the average proportion reported by parishes CARA has worked with in the past (50 percent).

- Twelve percent of St. Ann respondents are involved in two or more ministries or activities and 9 percent are involved in three or more.
- Fifty-one percent are *not* involved with any parish ministries or activities.

In the remainder of this report comparison is made between three groups of respondents according to their involvement in parish activities:

- Those *not* involved in any parish ministries or activities (51 percent or 372 respondents)
- Those involved in one parish ministry or activity (28 percent or 205 respondents)
- Those involved with two or more ministries or activities (21 percent or 146 respondents)

#### **Section III: Assessment of Parish Life and Needs**

Overall, the results of the St. Ann Parish Life Survey are very positive. Sixteen particular areas were addressed in the survey instrument. These areas are featured in this section of the report, though readers are advised to consult the response frequencies in Appendix I of this document for response rates and other pertinent information about these data. These areas of parish life addressed are:

- Just under nine in ten give a "good" or "excellent" rating to the sense of community within the parish; outreach to and advocacy for those in need; vision provided by parish leaders; encouragement to share one's time, talents and treasure with the parish; and spreading the Gospel or evangelizing.











More than nine in ten rate positively the leadership provided by the pastor and the helpfulness of the parish office staff.

- The Invictus Youth Ministry programs, Youth Faith Formation programs, and Adult Religious Enrichment programs receive a positive evaluation from about nine in ten respondents.
- Just under nine in ten say the Parish Finance Council and Parish Pastoral Council are "good" or "excellent."
- Nursery care provided during Mass is given a positive evaluation by slightly more than eight in ten.

Just under six in ten give an "excellent" evaluation to the helpfulness of the parish office staff and the Parish Pastoral Council. The Parish Finance Council receives as high an evaluation from four in ten respondents.











## Reasons for Not Sending a Child to St. Ann School

Only respondents who have children who could have attended St. Ann Catholic School in the past five years but did not were asked to respond to a question about why they did not send their child(ren) there. Some 275 responded to the question. Among the pre-set choices offered to respondents, they are most likely to cite financial considerations or tuition costs (14 percent) and the quality of education at the school (9 percent). One in 20 cites the lack of specialized instruction for those with special needs.

- Attend a different Catholic school or church
- Other

#### **Strong Public School System**

Seven in ten of the respondents who wrote in the *other* category said they preferred the Arlington public school system to St. Ann's Catholic School. Following are some of their remarks:

Public school options deemed better.

Arlington Public Schools are very good.

*Already paying \$ taxes for public school!! Cost – schools are great locally.* 

Arlington Public Schools are among the best in the nation and free.

Public school is excellent and we want our kids to learn with students from different backgrounds.

Public schools in area are excellent and offer more.

Quality of APS and gifted program.

Size limitations can't compete with courses offered in public schools.













Nine in ten or slightly fewer at St. Ann Parish give a positive evaluation to parish outreach to teens and children.

- Parish outreach to Hispanics/Latinos receives a positive evaluation from nine in ten.
- At least seven in ten rate as "good" or "excellent" parish outreach to those sick or homebound (82 percent), those grieving (74 percent), and those in financial need (70 percent).
- Eight in ten say the parish is at least "good" at reaching out to new parishioners. Slightly more than half give the parish a positive evaluation for its outreach to inactive Catholics.
- Parish outreach to senior citizens receives a positive rating from more than seven in ten respondents, with just over six in ten saying outreach to young adults is at least "good."

Hispanic/Latino(a) respondents are *least* likely to say the parish is "excellent" in its outreach to Hispanics/Latinos(as). Seventy-eight percent of Hispanics/Latinos(as) say the parish's outreach to Hispanic/Latinos(as) is "good" or "excellent," compared to 83 percent of Asians or Pacific Islanders and 93 percent of whites, Anglos or Caucasians.

Those responding to the question who are single (85 respondents) are *less* likely than others to give a positive evaluation to outreach to single adults (38 percent compared to 51 percent).

Similarly, those responding to the question who are married (362 respondents) are *less* likely than others to give a positive evaluation to parish outreach to married couples (64 percent compared to 80 percent).

Finally, those responding to the question who are divorced or separated (23 respondent) are *less* likely than others to say the parish's outreach to those divorced or separated is "good" or "excellent" (22 percent compared to 48 percent).

Parish outreach to Hispanics/Latinos(as) receives an "excellent" evaluation from more than four in ten respondents.

- More than a quarter give an "excellent" rating to outreach to those sick or homebound (41 percent), those grieving (34 percent), and those in financial need (28 percent).
- Four in ten say outreach to new parishioners is "excellent." Outreach to inactive Catholics receives as high an evaluation from two in ten.
- More than two in ten give an "excellent" rating to outreach to senior citizens (29 percent) and young adults (23 percent).
- A quarter report that outreach to married couples is "excellent." Less than two in ten say the same about outreach to those divorced or separated and to single adults.







Those identifying as white, Anglo or Caucasian are *least* likely to give an "excellent" rating to outreach to single adults, married couples, those divorced or separated, young adults, senior citizens, inactive Catholics, and new parishioners.








# **Differences by Level of Involvement**

Those involved with at least two parish ministries or activities are *less* likely than others to say the parish is "excellent" in its outreach to single adults and those divorced or separated.




# **Differences by Marital Status**

Although it does not rise to the level of statistical significance, it is worth noting that 4 percent of those divorced or separated (23 responded to the question) rate parish outreach to those divorced or separated as "excellent," compared to 18 percent of other respondents.

A third list outreach to those sick or homebound among their top three groups for priority. A quarter list those grieving and those in financial need.

- Three in ten list outreach to young adults among their top three. Less than two in ten list senior citizens.
- Outreach to inactive Catholics is listed by about a quarter, with two in ten listing outreach to new parishioners.
- Less than two in ten list outreach to those divorced or separated (19 percent), married couples (16 percent), and single adults (13 percent).
- One in 20 lists outreach to Hispanics/Latinos(as) as one of their top three priorities.

Formation-related needs are the top four needs given priority. More than eight in ten give at least "somewhat" priority to each of these formation-related needs: Youth Faith Formation programs (88 percent), Invictus Youth Ministry programs (88 percent), and Adult Religious Enrichment (82 percent). Eight in ten give at least "somewhat" priority to St. Ann Catholic School, with three-quarters giving at least "somewhat" priority to adult Bible study programs.

- Nearly eight in ten give at least "somewhat" priority to promoting peace and justice opportunities.
- Upkeep of facilities such as the Old Convent is given "somewhat" or "very much" priority by two in three respondents. Half give at least "somewhat" priority to additional space for parking.
- Nearly two in three give at least "somewhat" priority to providing retreat opportunities.
- More devotions, such as rosaries and Adoration, are given at least "somewhat" priority by almost six in ten respondents.

#### **Comparisons to Parishes Nationally**

St. Ann respondents are 23 percentage points *less* likely than those at parishes nationally to give "somewhat" or "very much" priority to having more devotions (rosaries, Adoration) (57 percent compared to 80 percent).

# "Very Much" Priority

Formation-related needs for children and youth are most likely to receive high priority from responding parishioners. Between 55 and 61 percent give "very much" priority to Youth Faith Formation programs, Invictus Youth Ministry programs, and St. Ann Catholic School.

Promoting peace and justice opportunities receives "very much" priority from more than four in ten respondents.

- More than four in ten give "very much" priority to Adult Religious Enrichment, with just under three in ten giving as much priority to adult Bible study programs.
- Upkeep of facilities such as the Old Convent receives "very much" priority from three in ten respondents.
- A quarter place "very much" priority on providing retreat opportunities. Two in ten give as much priority to having more devotions.
- Two in ten say the parish should give "very much" priority to having additional space for parking.

## **Comparisons to Parishes Nationally**

Those at St. Ann Parish are *less* likely than those at parishes nationally to give "very much" priority to having more devotions (20 percent compared to 39 percent).

# Differences by Children's Attendance at the Parish School




# Differences by Children's Participation in Faith Formation

# **Differences by Ethnicity**




# **Differences by Generation**




The more involved respondents are with ministries or activities at the parish, the more likely they are to give "very much" priority to St. Ann School and to Invictus Youth Ministry programs.

- About one in ten lists additional space for parking and more devotions as one of their top three priorities.

#### **Needed Ministries and Programs**

Respondents were asked to write in a response to this question: *On what need or program should St. Ann's most focus on the next three years?* Some 552 wrote in a response to that question. Appendix II presents the complete transcription of all open-ended responses to this question according to Mass time of response.

The most common needs expressed are those relating to social justice (mentioned 160 times), worship related needs (mentioned 86 times) and evangelization and community outreach (mentioned 76 times).

Many comments mentioned more than one topic and some topics do not fit neatly into just one category. However, responses can be grouped into the eight broad categories below, plus an "other" category for miscellaneous topics. A discussion of each category follows with some sample comments (lightly edited for grammar and punctuation).

- Social justice, charity, and social outreach
- Worship-related needs
- Evangelization and a greater involvement
- Formation and outreach to children, teens and youth
- Adult faith formation and spiritual growth
- More focus on St. Ann's Parish School
- Facility-related needs
- Young adult ministry
- Other

#### Social Justice, Charity, and Social Outreach

Social justice and social action include all parish work directed at advancing social concerns in the wider world, nation and local community. It also includes all charity, advocacy, and action on behalf of justice. Close to one-third of those responding said they want more involvement by the parish in helping others. Some examples of these responses are listed below:

Social justice issues.

Aid to poor/disadvantaged.

Haiti Mission outreach and adult religious education.

Helping a very affluent community understand the needs of those who are poor, both in Arlington and in D.C. region.

Homeless shelters and food banks.

Involving members in outreach activities. How about a ministries fair? Include youth activities, pairing with overseas parishes, pontifical mission services, food banks for poor, SOME, VOICE, liturgical ministries (choir, lector, LEMs).

Opportunities for service activities that we can do as a family.

Social outreach in our own neighborhood, as well as extending our charitable exercises globally. The need is great.

The church needs to be more prominent in helping local charities and promoting itself to local Catholics frustrated by other parishes.

Ayuda a los pobres y ayuda a los parrocos. Porque ellos son la guia de la communidad. [Help the poor and the priests. Because they are the guides of the community.]

1) Social outreach. 2) Increase parish efforts to be green – supporting Pope's climate change goals. –

Showing mercy and openness to people who might be afraid of coming to church – divorced or abortion or homeless.

Food bank, clothing. Feed and clothe.

Homeless in Arlington and abroad.

Programs for poor.

The poor among us.

Assistance for the needy in the DC community.

Assistance to the "working poor."

Outreach to mentally ill and homeless.

Outreach to the poor through food assistance and campaigning for more affordable housing.

Involving children and families in social justice programs and opportunities.

Positive joyous celebration of family Mass. Don't need the endless social justice lectures.

Any "social justice" programs should be non-political.

#### **Worship-related Needs**

One in six mentions worship related needs. The most common needs mentioned relate to the Mass times, the length of the homilies and Mass, and the music. A few mention the need for childcare during Mass. Below is a sample of their responses:

Mass times and length of homilies and Mass.

More programs for young adults with small children. 9:30 or 10 a.m. Mass time preferred to 11 a.m. 7:30 too early for first Mass. Homilies have great messages, but long.

Social justice/outreach/giving. Masses should not be longer than 1 hour. We lose so many people after Communion because we have to spend 10 minutes welcoming everyone before final blessing. I like welcoming people, so maybe we cut some singing through the Mass to allow extra time at end. One verse of a song instead of four, etc.

Young adults with small kids meet and greet, form community; website hard to navigate for info. Homilies: message beautiful but often very long-winded. Also, I find the Mass times challenging. 7:30 too early. Think 8:00 and 9:30 would be nice.

Fr. Mel's homilies too long.

Note: Please have more than one cross on Good Friday. There is no reason Mass should last one hour and 40 minutes.

Shorten the Mass.

Stop the birthday/anniversary recognition at end of Mass. Few raise their hands. It extends Mass by 10 minutes and doesn't help traffic problem.

Change Mass back to 9:30 start time.

Daycare during the 9 am Mass with a 2 & 5 year old, we just try to make it through Mass. We have little time to listen to Scripture. The 11 am Mass with childcare is too late for us due to naps.

Please coordinate times of Sunday faith formation class with Mass times. Too hard to juggle both on Sunday when times are difficult. Please end Mass on time. Music is good, but too much, causes Mass to run too long.

Would like a Sunday night Mass.

1) We should bring more people. 2) Unify young adults (Spanish Mass). 3) More upbeat music. 4) Change the Spanish Mass to <u>earlier</u>.

Keeping the Masses to one hour – focus on offering them Communion. Also, too much singing at the 9 am Mass, only do 2 verses.

Focusing more on the Eucharist as the heart of Sunday Mass and using hymns that are familiar to the congregation so that they are able to join in. New hymnals – why? Reworked hymns with different music. Good Friday – veneration of the Cross, unfamiliar hymns, long time for this section of the Mass.

Would like quiet (music-free) Mass on weekends at 9 (later too) – better for thoughtful meditation and focus.

It should focus on the 5:30 vigil Mass. It used to be a low-key reverential Mass finished before 6:30 p.m., well suited to the older parishioners and families with small children who are its mainstay. It is now an extravaganza, which usually goes on until 6:45 p.m. Too much singing and little time for prayer and reflection. Exit time now occurs immediately after Communion. I could not concentrate on this questionnaire because the vocalist never stopped singing. It is no wonder the bulk of the congregation comes late and leaves early.

1) Helping the homeless in Arlington County. 2) Mass is too long, too many verses during songs.

Focusing on Mass – it's too long. Does not encourage families to want to come. Music is too long, too many verses. Cut down on \$ collections.

Less "performance" by the choir and more inviting people to sing. Large print hymnals.

Music should not be so loud.

Children's program on Sunday morning. Based on my experience volunteering in the nursery as the 11 am Mass, there is clearly a desire for parents to sit quietly at Mass without their children. I think there is a big need to be filled for more and better childcare/Sunday school. Currently, there is only a nursery at the 11 am Mass and it is multiple ages combined. I think it would be even better to have maybe another class or two of age groups that have more structured lesson/curriculum to teach the kids more about the Word of God. I believe it is a huge service for a church to provide childcare/Sunday school for kids so that parents can sit quietly and focus on their worship Sunday mornings. I heard a quote from Franklin Graham about how our primary reason for going to church should be to worship God, not just to hear a sermon or take communion. On days when the nursery is not open, all I do during Mass is control my kids. I don't take away anything from the service nor am I able to worship because I'm so focused on keeping my kids quiet. It is a big frustration for me and I'm

guessing for other parents as well.

Quizas no es una necesidad muy imporante pero ayudaria mucho oi tambien se. Podria contor con ayuda o quidad infantil durante la misa en espanol. Y especialmente cuando hay retiros para que los padres participan mas. [Maybe it's not very important, but it could help a lot: There could be babysitting or infant care during the Spanish Mass. And especially when there are withdrawals, for the parents can participate more.]

Me gustaria que hubiera guarderia para cuidados de ninos. [I wish there would be a babysitter to take care of the kids.]

Switch RE time so that it doesn't overlap with 9 am Mass. Also, didn't know that nursery care during Mass existed.

#### **Evangelization and Greater Involvement**

One in seven parishioners said evangelization or reaching out to inactive Catholics and involvement socially, offering parishioners a sense of belonging and a desire to come together are what should be focused on most over the next three years. Following are some of their responses:

Bringing back inactive Catholics and increasing the involvement of those currently at the parish.

Evangelization.

Finding ways to make new parishioners feel welcomed and understanding all the opportunities to become involved in the community. Also, parish office staff is so helpful.

Focus on inactive Catholics. Trying to identify/discover why they are inactive. Then provide steps to increase their activity. Nurturing them along their life's paths. Have day trips/events to create non-threatening dialogue/friendship, welcoming them.

Continuing to form a feeling of fellowship and family in the parish (everyone plays and can play a part in St. Ann's)!

Developing more parish community programs.

Get parishioners to know each other.

*In the spirit of Pope Francis, let LGBT people feel a more welcoming presence here.* 

Increasing the interaction between the Spanish and English speaking communities.

Being together, Hispanic and English speaking communities. We seem to have two churches, not one.

Lapsed Catholics.

#### Formation and Outreach to Children, Teens and Youth

One is seven parishioners said that formation for children, teens and youth should be the focus over the next three years. Following are some of their responses:

Developing the teen and youth program.

Helping youth understand and live their faith.

Invictus – keep teens active in church. Concerning adult religious education classes at parish, I didn't know we had them.

Religious education at all levels – children's curriculum (currently too repetitious grade to grade), adult Bible study, teens' spiritual development, family study.

Youth faith and youth programs.

Ministry to teens and children to grow and preserve future of church.

Social and youth ministries.

Youth – providing opportunities for service and teaching what the Church believes about important issues. Retreats? Are getting anti-Christian messages everywhere else.

Focus on making faith formation more interactive for kids. St. Charles (where we transferred from) has a more hands on program (less reading from book and filling out worksheets – more crafts, drama, etc. incorporated into lessons). Particularly important for the Wednesday sessions where kids have already been sitting all day in school. The series of books at St. Charles were also more "kid friendly."

Improving children's liturgy to make church interesting to them.

Formacion de fé para niños. Un programa mejor estructurado como el programa de Ingles. Cambio de hora de la formacion de fé en español. Seria mejor hace lo en dia de semana, como el de Ingles. [Diferente horario en la mañana para misa de español (en Ingles)]. {Faith Formation for children. A better structured program as the English program is. Change time of the faith formation in Spanish. It would be better to do the

day of the week, such as the English ones. [Different time in the morning for Spanish Mass (in English )]}.

#### **Adult Faith Formation and Spiritual Growth**

Just over one in ten parishioners would like to participate in more faith formation programs. Formation in the parish includes all aspects of parish life involving explaining informing and forming parishioners of all ages in Scripture, and Church teaching. Parishioners yearn to strengthen their faith and wish for St. Ann to focus on this aspect of the church. Following are some examples:

*Spiritual growth of parishioners and education.* 

Religious education, it's awful right now. The leadership is harsh, cold and not welcoming.

*Religious education for adults to strengthen sense of community.* 

Identify the most effective and charismatic and joyous parishioners who seem to live the Gospel in their daily lives and interview and learn their stories, their motivations and their explanation in their own words. What are the keys to trusting God and their fellow parishioners and neighbors and distill those "stories" and lessons in how to model Jesus in quiet but determined commitment to love/charity/mercy/justice and living faith. And then ask for their ideas on how to convey that joy in their actions and behavior to others who may be more fearful or more difficult to convince that more boldly "living one's faith" in daily interaction with others might actually lift one's fears and phobias about reaching out and being more open hearted and vulnerable to others might be the paths to a better spiritual life.

I would strongly urge the parish to begin a social/spiritual program for ages 30-55 single Catholics (could be 25-55).

I think that having religious scholars participate in religious education would be very good.

Family bonding, going to Masses. Parents and children stay together, pray rosary, Adoration.

Adult Bible study. Single and married life groups.

Maintaining support of faith formation classes. We attract people from all over due to the quality.

Faith building to meet current world environment.

Doing a great job St. Ann! Continue working on spirituality.

Building faith through prayer and study. Extra note: current pastor is energizing parish – great job!

More opportunities for devotional practices (Adoration, Eucharistic procession) and catechesis for families. This strengthens and builds faith, individual Catholic witness, evangelization and community, which will increase involvement and commitment to social justice issues and peace.

Bible study for adults.

#### More Focus on St. Ann School

One in ten parishioners stated that the focus for the parish over the next three years should be St. Ann Catholic School. Prominent among comments are tuition, quality of teaching and school facilities. Below is a sampling of these comments.

Hacer St. Ann school accecible a todos. El precio lo hace limitado a los ricos. Ofrece misa en espanol for las mananas. Porque solo prioridad y acomodo a la misa en ingles [illegible] por la manana? [Make the school of St. Ann accessible to everyone. The price makes it limited to the rich. Offer Mass in Spanish in the mornings. Because the Mass in English is the only priority in the morning?]

Tuition for schooling, especially for lesser families.

St. Ann's School and maintaining Blue Ribbon status.

School facilities upgrade (not competitive with peer schools). Moving 9 am Mass to 9:30 or 11 am Mass to 10:30.

Quality teachers at St. Ann School.

New leadership for the school. Need a principal who recognizes poor teachers.

*Expand the school – Catholic education is foundation of the future Church.* 

The school. Teacher salaries are not competitive with Arlington Diocese schools. We need to attract the best and brightest teachers to be competitive. Families will leave, and soon, without improvement to faculty and reduction in turnover.

Improving the physical facilities of the school, including the gym, classrooms, etc.

#### **Facility-related Needs**

Just over one in 20 parishioners said the focus should be on the parish facilities and the need to update them. The comments were wide ranging. Following are a few samples:

More art in the church.

Columbarium was mentioned. Would support.

Security of church and school buildings.

Restoration of the rectory's roof, garage door, interior painting, rug replacement.

Stained glass windows in the church.

Improved mechanical and lighting systems to be more sustainable.

*Old convent – can it be used? Maybe the Diocese can remodel for retired priests.* 

#### **Young Adult Ministry**

Almost one in 20 parishioners suggest that the focus for St. Ann's Parish should be young adult ministry. Some examples of these responses appear below:

*Groups such as Bible study and young adult outreach.* 

Outreach to young adults and opportunities for them to volunteer with parish and in local community.

18-22 away at college: keep in contact. Community: soup suppers, potlucks, small faith groups. Teens and youth ministry programs are cliquey.

Day trips/pilgrimages to local sites. But need to actively encourage <u>all</u> adults so it doesn't come across as just for older adults. Remember singles, 30s and 40s who are stuck in the middle and tend to be most likely to be left out.

Evangelization to young adults!! Theology on Tap gatherings out at a bar – young adult social groups involving activities and social outreach. Get out of the building!! Find my kids who don't come to church anymore.

#### Other

Just over one in ten comment on needs or programs that do not easily fit into any of the categories above. Some of the comments are compliments rather than a listing of needs. Below is a sampling of these comments:

Integration of technology (mobile, social media) in current/prospective parishioner outreach and communication.

Keep doing what you're doing, it's great.

Leaders on committees/ministries should serve time-limited appointments. <u>All</u> leadership roles should rotate.

Uniting families of children with special needs. I feel like we are the only family in the parish with a child with Downs Syndrome. Is it possible?

Selection of gift presenters at Mass. Should include single people, not just families.

Need an email option to communicate with the parish office.

Kudos to our parish priest and community. You have been doing a great job. Please keep it up. Thanks.

How about teaching English instead of perpetuating "native" languages?

Environmental initiatives. (Please let us have Fr. Mel and Pascal as long as possible. They are a gift to us.)

#### **Priorities for Social Justice Efforts**


Respondents were asked to choose one top priority for parish contributions to social justice efforts. St. Ann respondents are particularly likely to say their top priorities are charities such as homeless shelters and food banks (49 percent) and empowerment of the poor such as job programs (28 percent). Between 6 to 9 percent list these as their top priority for parish contributions to social justice efforts: participating in a program where the parish adopts an overseas parish, like Haiti Mission Outreach (9 percent), addressing global issues through organizations like Catholic Relief Services (8 percent), and groups that advocate for the poor such as those lobbying for change or providing legal assistance (6 percent).

# **Differences by Generation**

A plurality of members of the oldest three generations cite charities such as homeless shelters and food banks as their top priority for social justice efforts, with those of the youngest generation especially likely to indicate that empowerment of the poor such as job programs as their top priority.



#### **Attraction to the Parish**

Those attending Mass at the parish report being especially attracted to the parish by its open, welcoming spirit. More than nine in ten say that spirit attracts them "somewhat" or "very much."



































One example is the recent choice to focus on letter writing campaigns to government representatives on environmental issues while letter writing campaigns on pro-life issues and pro-traditional

family values have been dropped.
